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What Counts as a Business Expense?

What Is a Business Expense?

A business expense is any cost that is **ordinary and necessary** for running your business. These are typically deductible, meaning they reduce your taxable income — and lower your tax bill.

Think of it this way:

If the expense helps you earn income, grow your business, or operate day to day, it likely counts as a business expense.

Common Business Expense Categories

1. Office Supplies & General Expenses

These are everyday essentials used directly in the course of business:

- Pens, paper, notebooks
- Printer ink and toner
- Postage and shipping supplies

- Envelopes, folders, staples
- Cleaning supplies for a dedicated business space

2. Business Meals

You can deduct 50% of meals that are directly related to business:

- Meals with clients, partners, or prospects
- Working lunches during business travel
- Coffee or snacks at a business meeting

Tip: Always keep the receipt and note who you met with and the business purpose.

3. Mileage & Travel

If you use your personal vehicle for business purposes or travel for work, those expenses may qualify:

- Mileage (tracked using a log or app)
- Tolls and parking fees
- Airfare, hotels, rental cars for business travel
- Meals and transportation while traveling

Tip: Commutes from home to a regular workplace are not deductible — but driving to client meetings is.

4. Software & Subscriptions

Any tools or subscriptions you pay for to run your business may count:

- Accounting software (e.g., QuickBooks, Xero, Wave)
- Google Workspace, Microsoft Office, Dropbox
- Scheduling tools (Calendly, Acuity)
- Industry-specific platforms (Canva, Adobe, CRMs)

Tip: If a subscription is partially personal, only the business-use portion is deductible.

5. Advertising & Marketing

All efforts to promote your business and reach new customers can be deducted:

- Website hosting and domain registration
- Business cards and flyers
- Facebook/Instagram/Google ads
- Graphic design and branding services
- Sponsorships and promotional merchandise

6. Professional Services

If you hire professionals to support your business, their fees are deductible:

- Bookkeepers and accountants
- Lawyers and consultants
- Virtual assistants or contractors
- Tax preparation and advisory fees

7. Rent & Utilities

This includes the cost of maintaining a space for your business:

- Monthly rent for office or studio space
- Utilities: electricity, water, gas, internet
- Cell phone plans (business portion only)
- Shared co-working spaces

Home Office Deduction (if applicable):

You may qualify if you use part of your home exclusively and regularly for business.

- You can deduct a portion of rent/mortgage, electricity, internet, and insurance
- The deduction is based on the square footage used for business

Bonus: Other Deductible Expenses to Consider

- Bank fees and interest on business loans
- Education or training related to your industry
- Business insurance premiums
- Licenses, permits, or certifications
- Business gifts (limited to \$25 per person/year)

Keep Your Receipts & Stay Organized

No matter the category, always keep a record:

- Save physical or digital receipts
- Make notes on business purpose
- Use software or apps to stay consistent (QuickBooks, Expensify, Google Drive folders)
